

Marital status

- Majority of mother in burden of loan in the process of treatment of their husband
- Male ego being the primary reason for women suffering
- Majority of mother going through a hardship of a single and discriminated parent

Mean age of marriage

- Eighty percent of mother were the victim of early marriage which increased their vulnerability to infection and poor health
- It also increased the number of young widow mothers resulting in social isolation and lifelong struggles

Education and literacy

- Lack of education among the participants was the root cause behind all the sufferings and challenges.
- Realization among all that they were victimized due to lack of proper education and their infection have created more trauma as they did not possess the courage to cope up the challenges along the way.

Indigenous skills

- No any participants possessed any indigenous skills
- Goat farming training was feasible and applicable as their income generating source.

Cast and ethnicity

- More than fifty percent of participants were from Dalit and Janajati community who had low financial status as well as level of awareness
- Lack of education and weak financial condition combined increased the risk of being infected

Exposure visit of Participants

- Participants were taken to Bhimsen Pillar (Dharahara), Pashupati Temple, Kathmandu Durbar Square and Narayanhiti (Palace) with networking and awareness purpose.
- ICIMOD knowledge park was added to list this year which added to their existing knowledge about agriculture and irrigation system.

New Initiation

Environment friendly action and Gifts for Participants

 Considering participant's nutritional need, environmental health and ecological factor Setu Nepal initiated to provide fruit plants to training participants. This year they were gifted with Litchi and Kumquat plants to participants of Dang and Kaski districts respectively based on climatic adaptability. In addition, we also provided some clothes through our cloth banking service as a gift to the participants.





Post Training assessment

After receiving the livelihood trainings, the participants:

- are doing remarkable jobs in bringing up their children
 - are getting involved in socio-economic activities
 - curious to learn all this vital knowledge
- loved to involve in meditation, during which they had to go in the past mentally and feel every emotion that came up, just until they arrive again in the present
- became aware about the natural process of menstruation and that is indeed nothing to be ashamed of

"We were unaware about how the 5 days would pass; we felt it would be very hard for us. Now we feel that it is very hard to depart from here".

"We are very thankful to SETU Nepal for this training as it has changed our perception about the community behavior to vards us. We have realized that time is a great healer and as time passes by the things become easier".



"I want to include other HIV positive sisters too in this business and provide them the needed support that is within my capacity so that we all can rise together and create a better future for all of us."

During Training

She is one of our hard working beneficiary of this year. She is a mother of two children. Her daughter is already married. Now she lives with her son who was only one-year-old when her husband died of HIV. It was only after his death that she knew her son to be HIV positive and she says it is the bitterest experience of her life. Though she is happy that her daughter was found to be negative.

Post training status

After participating in the livelihood training program, she is doing well with the seed money by utilizing it in sewing bags.

During our interaction she said that she also invested half of the seed money in Fruits (orange) selling but found the business to be less profit making. So, now she is utilizing the rest of the seed money in sewing grocery bags. She says she can make double profit of the investment by using this skill.

She is very happy with this achievement and happily expresses that she has opened a saving account in bank with saving amount of around six to seven hundred in a week which was nil before the training. She is currently working with a partner to uplift her business and stands as potential participant of our next year entrepreneurship training.

This year...



- She has set an example in her district for her hardship and has been a source of inspiration for many women going through the same journey


EDUCATION PROGRAM




Each year, SETU Nepal is supporting 100 children for their education, by paying school fees as well as providing them the necessary school supplies like school bags and stationary. This year we made it to 102. We try to support these children throughout their whole school level if they show the necessary motivation and dedication. If we observe a lack of interest coming from one of the students or if they fail in two academic years, we will discontinue the support and reintroduce new needler children that show more potential and interest. Furthermore, if other organizations are willing to support a few of our students, we are happy to let those organizations take over the support, so that we can include needy children instead. This year, nine students successfully passed *Secondary Education*

Examination and have been looking forward to continuing their education for a prosperous career outlook.








Fund raising activities

1-rupee campaign (Khutrukke Abhiyan)

Concept:

- One rupee per day per member of a family
- More than 80 families including around 300 members have committed to our initiative on a long term basis
- Collected more than 1,00,000 Nrs. so far
- Through this campaign we have started School Strengthening program in a government school located in Nakhipot, Lalitpur and Uttarpani, Makawanpur

Nutrition and School Strengthening Programs



After successful handover of the day meal program, in Bhanu Primary School in Bhattedada, Lalitpur we have started the similar beneficiary meal plan in in another government school Shree Choina Bina Guru Ganesh Aadharbhut Bidhyalaya as a part of our School Strengthening Program. Located in middle part of Lalitpur, the school has high irregularity and dropout rate. We first found out that the program was being run with very hard effort of the school and had no any fund raising source. After Setu initiated the program, the parents were made accountable for Rs.5 per head of the children and we contribute Rs.10 in the same. The remaining money after expenses goes to fund raising goals of the school. We also distributed necessary utensils such as plates and other cutleries to the students to facilitate the day meal program and to make sure that they have access to materials needed to have a productive time at school.

We aim to make the school management and parents self-sustainable for the program on a long run.

Setu Nepal Social Enterprise

Although our programs run well through many years, struggles come along the way and we came to realize that fundraising is the main base for running and managing the decided and expected programs of NGO. Through this realization SETU Nepal has established SETU Nepal Social Enterprise which works under the management of SETU Nepal. SETU Nepal being a NGO, it cannot conduct profit making activities on its own. But as a company SETU Nepal Social Enterprise can conduct different profit making activities so that different fund raising goals can be met through this organization. All the profit achieved from the activities run by SETU Nepal Social Enterprise will be utilized by SETU Nepal for its operation and welfare.

SETU NEPAL Social Enterprise will work under the following objectives:

- To conduct awareness programs in women community for enhancing their health, education and social aspects.
- By developing the source of income, conduct different kinds of workshops, trainings, seminars etc.
- To conduct long term as well as short term income generating, vocational trainings for the self-reliance, independence and entrepreneurship of the deprived women.
- Facilitating the tourism, establishing clean, hygienic and environment friendly Home stays, Eco-village, Meditation Centre etc.
- Cultivation of fruits, vegetables and grains, Animal husbandry, fishery, Poultry for self-sustainability of the organization.
- To increase the availability of education especially for the schedule cast schedule tribe deprived communities as well as to the differently able people to empower them.
- To educate people about environment protection and preservation along with conducting research programs and advocacy.
- Also, to support others in prevention of poverty, encourage arts and literature, sports and other cultural activities.



Year 2019 in review

- 56 mothers were directly benefitted by Livelihood Training
